Tomasz Mróz, Ph.D.

Tomasz Mróz (born in 1975, Tarnów, Poland) received his M.A. in philosophy from the Institute of Philosophy, Silesian University – Katowice, Poland. In 1999 he started doctoral studies in philosophy at The Jagiellonian University (Kraków).

In 2000 T. Mróz was appointed as an assistant lecturer at the Institute of Philosophy, Pedagogical University of Zielona Góra. Then in Zielona Góra in 2004 he received his Ph.D. Dissertation title was *Wincenty Lutosławski – a Platonist and Neo-Messianist*, and it was supervised by Professor Ryszard Palacz. Three reviewers (Professors: Tadeusz Bieńkowski, Wit Jaworski and Józef Lipiec) examined this thesis, which finally received an award from The Ministry of Education. In 2004 T. Mróz was appointed as an assistant professor at The Institute of Philosophy, University of Zielona Góra. While working in Zielona Góra T. Mróz has been awarded by the Rector of the University six times, and received scholarships from his home university.

In 2007 T. Mróz was a beneficiary of a conference grant from The Foundation for Polish Science and Warsaw Scientific Society. In 2011 he finished working on the research project: *Plato in Poland 1800-1950* (funded by the Ministry of Science, 2008-2011).

In 2013 T. Mróz pursued research sponsored by Congregatio Resurrectionis on S. Pawlicki manuscripts on Plato. Twice (2013, 2015) he received Erasmus Teaching Staff Mobility Grant and delivered series of lectures (*Selected Issues in the History of Polish Philosophy*) at Philosophical Faculty of Vilnius University (Lithuania).

In February 2014 T. Mróz received postdoctoral degree (habilitation) from Faculty of Social Sciences, University of Silesia, where he passed postdoctoral colloquium, after having his postdoctoral thesis (*Platon w Polsce 1800-1950. Typy recepcji – autorzy – problemy*, 2012 [*Plato in Poland 1800-1950. Types of reception – authors – problems*) examined by four reviewers (Professors Bogdan Dembiński, Stanisław Janeczek, Ewa Starzyńska-Kościuszko and Marian Wesoły).

Later on the same year (September-October) T. Mróz won a Bednarowski Fellowship and was appointed as a visiting fellow at The Centre for Ethics, Philosophy and Public Affairs (<u>CEPPA</u>) of the University of St Andrews with additional affiliation to the School of Classics.

In 2015 (January-June) T. Mróz pursued research in The University of Iowa (Department of Classics) as a Kosciuszko Foundation Fellow.

In 2016 (June-July) T. Mróz examined a collection of documents contributing to Scottish-Polish philosophical relations in Peterhouse Library (Cambridge), sponsored by The Lanckoronski de Brzezie Foundation.

In 2019 a research group headed by T. Mróz was founded in the Institute of Philosophy: "<u>Ancient Φilosophy Reception</u>".

In 2017–2021 T. Mróz was granted funding from National Programme for the Development of Humanities (Uniwersalia 2.1) to publish his book in English as *Plato in Poland 1800–1950*. Language editing of the book was done by Una Maclean-Hańckowiak and the book appeared in <u>Academia Verlag</u> in April 2021.


In 2018–2022 T. Mróz was a principal investigator in a state-funded project of National Science Center (Opus): Stanisław Lisiecki (1872–1960) – zapomniany znawca Platona i historyk filozofii starożytnej [Stanisław Lisiecki (1872–1960) – a Forgotten Expert on Platon and a Historian of Ancient Philosophy]. Thanks to this project a new book series was established: "Studia i Teksty z Dziejów Recepcji Filozofii Starożytnej" ["Studies and Texts in the Reception of Ancient

Philosophy"]. Editorial board is constituted by Dariusz Kubok, T. Mróz (editor-in-chief), Zbigniew Nerczuk and Artur Pacewicz.

In 2022 Rector of the University of Zielona Góra awarded T. Mróz with "Rector's Grant". In May-June of 2022, at Martin-Luther-Universität Halle, T. Mróz, as Gastprofessor, held a course: *Selected Topics in the History of Philosophy in Poland*. This stay was funded by Aleksander-Brückner-Zentrum für Polenstudien from the funds of Deutscher Akademischer Austauschdienst (DAAD).

In 2023-2024 T. Mróz was a part-time research fellow in an International Research Teams Project, *Oral History and the Classics*, led by prof. Jaroslav Daneš in the Philosophical Faculty of the University of Hradec Králové.


